Hamilton/Dallas Gift:

In April, Alpha Sig Alumnus Mr. Bill Dallas ('75) and gold medal winning figure skater Scott Hamilton, teamed up to make a joint donation to BGSU. Totaling \$3 million dollars, Mr. Dallas and Mr. Hamilton made the donation to start a new program on entrepreneurship at BGSU.

Mr. Hamilton's connections to the university are strong, even though he never pursued a degree there. He was adopted as a child by two university faculty members and learned to skate at the BGSU Ice Arena. He was named an honorary alumnus in 1985 and received an honorary doctorate in 1994.

A four time national champion and world champion, Mr. Hamilton, 45, won a gold medal at the 1984 Winter Olympic games in Sarajevo.

Mr. Dallas, 48, graduated in 1977 from BGSU where he was a member of Alpha Sigma Phi, as well as a member of the baseball team. Mr. Dallas even had Mr. Hamilton's father as a professor. After teaching courses related to entrepreneurship at some universities on the West Coast, he began to encourage BGSU to form a program.

Mr. Dallas is currently chairman and chief executive officer of Ownit Mortgage Solutions, and co-founded B&B Restaurant Ventures with Fox Sports.

"This is just a passion of trying to help people figure out what they want to do" Mr. Dallas said. "I don't think everyone should start their own business, but everyone should be entrepreneurial."

The only other gift to BGSU larger than this was a pledge of \$6.7 million made in January by an anonymous donor to support scholarships for the President's Leadership Academy.

This year a brother from Gamma Zeta, Matt Bowles, was awarded this prestigious national honor at the Grand Chapter in Columbus Ohio. Matt pledged Alpha Sigma Phi as a freshman and just completed his time as an undergraduate in May. During his tenure he held several offices and served on

the Prudential Committee twice. Matt was awarded the 'Brother of the Year' award locally for Gamma Zeta in May. During Spring Awards this year he was honored by the entire Greek community at BGSU with the Steven R. Hanna & Kevin L. Ross Award which recognizes an outstanding Greek Senior at BGSU. In addition, Matt was accomplished outside the realm of Gamma Zeta posting accolades that include a Student Life Award recognizing outstanding Student Leadership, being selected by BGSU as its nominee for the Rhodes Scholarship, and graduating Magna Cum Laude as well as being awarded University Honors.

When asked about the Hargear award Matt credited those older brothers who taught him the values of the Fraternity as a pledge and a young brother. After being nominated he completed a questionnaire for the committee in which he spoke of what he called his

"cornerstone of brotherhood" that was built for him by the "example and dedication" of his brothers. Matt stressed in his questionnaire that hundreds of brothers have come before him in Gamma Zeta and given their time, effort, and hope to build a proud tradition for Alpha Sigma Phi at BGSU. He ended with the comment, "I only hope that I did my part to make sure that our tradition is around and respected for another fifty plus years."

Matt is continuing his education by seeking a Law Degree from the University of Tennessee, College of Law, where he enrolled this August. He currently resides in Knoxville Tennessee. Congratulations Matt on a job well-done and good luck in law school.

Keith Kalland's Legacy Lives On:

Gov. Sonny Perdue has signed a resolution naming a 5.4-mile stretch of Ga. 138 from I-20 south to Ga. 212 after Kalland, one of Atlanta's top traffic reporters for 15 years.

Kalland, whose vast verbal repertorie kept metro Atlanta commuters laughing while also scrambling for their dictionaries, died Nov. 18, 2002, after a long illness. He was 51.

"Everyone who listened to him on the air felt they knew him" said Rep. Joe Wilkinson (R-Sandy Springs), who sponsored the resolution. "He was so personable and so entertaining. I think he did so much to calm the nerves of the metro area drivers."

Wilkinson carried a big green highway sign bearing the words Kieth Kalland Memorial Highway into Perdue's office Monday for a brief bill signing ceremony witnessed by Kalland's sons, John and Robby. John graduates this week from Heritage high school in Conyers and Robby is finishing eighth grade at Edwards middle school.

Perdue wondered aloud if there was a way to "put a ladder on that sign" in honor of one of Kalland's most memorable phrases, "the ubiquitous ladder in the roadway."

Kalland's status among Atlanta traffic reporters made it difficult to follow in his footsteps. In fact, in the 18 months since his passing, various reporters have performed his duties at WGST and Fox5 News, but none has truly claimed his position.

"Keith will never be replaced," said Cheryl White, director of operations for Total Traffic Network, which serves 11 metro radio in addition to Fox 5. "Keith created a niche for himself and a place no one else can fill." Radio listeners and TV viewers aren't alone in missing Kalland and his colorful summaries of Atlanta's twice-daily gridlock.

"I still can't believe he's not here," said Kim "The Kimmer" Peterson, afternoon talk show host of WGST. "He set the standard. He was a wordsmith."

Karlene Barron, a spokeswoman for the Georgia Department of Transportation, said signs designating the roadway most likely would be erected within a month.

Alumni Updates:

Michael Gardner ('79) recently wrote, stating that he has three children: Chris (15), Lauren (13) and Katie (6). He also reports that he's just finished up a recent 6 year stint on the Franklin School Board, serving as president for the last two years. Not ready to step out of public service, he was also just elected Alderman in Franklin District 3. In his spare time, he's also working on converting a 160,000 sq. ft. warehouse building into offices in the trendy Historic Third Ward in Milwaukee.

Chapter Update:

First. I'd like to give all of you an update in regards to how Spring Semester '04 ended for us. This semester we ended with over 2800 dollars raised for charitable organizations. That is roughly 66 dollars per member. We also ended with over 1800 hours of community service, not including Dance Marathon. That is roughly 43 hours for each member. For those of you who don't realize it, those figures are tremendous for our chapter. Last Spring semester we averaged 24 dollars raised per member and 11 community service hours per member. In addition, to round off the year, the chapter received a Bronze level Chapter Excellence award at the semester end Greek Awards Bankquet.
